Anti-Poverty Week 2024 (13-19 October)

With a population of 1,242,825 (ABS, 2021), Brisbane is on its way to becoming Australia's new world city as the host of the 2032 Olympic Games. However, it is far from perfect for everyone. Many people still struggle to meet basic needs like employment, education, income, housing, health, and a sense of belonging. The numbers reveal a troubling reality: poverty and disadvantage are significant issues in this city.

WHAT IS THE POVERTY LINE?

In Australia, the poverty line is generally defined as 50% of median household income.

Inclusive of housing costs, the poverty line is \$1,150.39 per week for a family comprising two adults, one of whom is working, and two dependent children; \$612.47 per week for a single person; and \$786.29 for a single parent and one child (Melbourne University, March 2024).

BELOW THE POVERTY LINE

Unemployment is often connected to poverty, but the latest 2021 Census data (ABS, 2021) shows a more complex reality. In Brisbane, 85% of people who can work are employed but still live in poverty.

HOUSING

The rate of homelessness is rapidly rising, globally, and here in Brisbane. Now, with a lack of social housing, unaffordable rents and mortgages, and a rising cost of living, many in our community are finding themselves without a home, or struggling to stay housed.



BELOW THE POVERTY LINE

From those families living under the poverty line, some ones are more at risk of poverty than others. Factors such as age, gender, family composition, paid work, sources of income and other characteristics can all have an impact.
